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# Will Cameron ever settle down?

Her romance with boyfriend Paul Sculfor on the rocks, an independent Cameron Diaz seems to embrace life as a single woman

**D**uring a recent night out at LA's Chateau Marmont, Cameron Diaz seemed to be living the life of a single girl. Though she's been dating British model (and Jennifer Aniston's ex) Paul Sculfor for almost a year, "she was with a bunch of guys and was flirting heavily with one of them," says an onlooker. "She certainly didn't look like somebody in a relationship. It looked like Paul was the furthest thing from her mind."

In fact, an insider confirms, while Cam, 36, and Paul, 38, still talk, "their romantic relationship is basically over." And Cameron — who called herself a commitment-phobe during her four-year relationship with Justin Timberlake, which ended in 2007 —

may be the one whose dating philosophy is getting in the way of a long-term romance with anyone.

"While all her friends around her are lucky in love, she finds herself often being seen as just 'one of the guys' — and that's what happened with Paul," the insider says. "She really liked him but was always so laid-back about their future together. She seemed so uninvested that he never thought of her as marriage material."

## But is Cameron happy?

Cameron may be perfectly content not to settle down. "She seems to enjoy being in a relationship," clinical psychologist Dr. Leslie Seppinni (who has not treated the actress) tells *Life &*

*Style*. "But she represents women who recognize that maybe they're not going to have one partner for a lifetime — and that should be okay."

Still, Cam hasn't completely given up on Paul. "She wants things to work out," says a second insider, who notes that Cameron feels more of a void in her life now that she and best friend Drew Barrymore have grown apart. "She's keeping her options open. She believes that what will be will be."

But if she winds up on her own, she feels she can still be happy. "People think if you're single, you're incomplete," Cameron once said. "No. The thing is, I don't want to be in a relationship that makes me incomplete."
